

The restrictions on how we gather are particularly felt at times when we would normally host events at the College. This week saw two major events, Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day, marked in a slightly different way.

Last Sunday a pre-recorded service, filmed in the Chapel, was made available to the Dover College community via YouTube. We are enormously grateful to Minister Debbie Scoble for presiding and to Lt Col Andrew Hodkinson (a current parent) for his moving address. THE STORY OF BILLIE NEVILL

Our new Marketing Coordinator, Louis Turner, was surprised to discover a link to Dover College history when he told his grandfather about his new role last month.

In the 1960s, Louis' grandparents were involved in the production of recorded newsletters for blind people. They had read and been fascinated by the inspirational accounts of Captain Wilfred 'Billie' Nevill. Whilst travelling through France one summer, they decided to visit the site of the Battle of the Somme where Wilfred commanded B Company of the 8th East Surreys.

As we all know, Wilfred Nevill is remembered for commencing the attack by encouraging his soldiers to kick footballs before them as they advanced towards the enemy lines. Wilfred was killed during the early phase of this assault.

Louis has a copy of the recording his grandparents made, which includes them narrating this incredible story of bravery in the face of adversity.
