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FROM HISTORY THE BAYEUX TAPESTRY

The Bayeux Tapestry is an embroidered cloth nearly 70 metres long and 50 cm tall. It depicts the events leading up to the Norman Conquest of England, culminating in the Battle of Hastings, from the point of view of the conquering Normans. Dated to the 11th century, it is now thought to have been made in England.

The Bayeux Tapestry is supposed to have hung in our Refectory! The measurements are correct. There were strong links with the Bishop of Bayeux who owned land in Dover after the Norman Conquest and rebuilt the
