#### From the Headmaster's Desk

It has been another busy week at the College, as reflected in this four page edition. From Duke of Edinburgh expeditions to sports fixtures, the 10X Business Challenge to online debates, pupils across the school have been living out our Round Square values of adventure, democracy, environmentalism, internationalism, leadership and service.

A special mention must be made of the eighteen Third and Fourth Form pupils who took in a practice Bronze Expedition last weekend. As those of you who live in the area will remember, the weather went from the sublime to the ridiculous over the two days - sometimes within a single hour! I was delighted to be there to meet the groups at a checkpoint just outside Ripple on Sunday morning. Sadly I underestimated the speed and navigation skills of the first first group, who reached the checkpoint some time before I estimated they would!

A highlight of the week was the Leadership and Teamwork Morning for the Lower Sixth. Organised by Mr Mousavi, this was a wonderful opportunity for the pupils to work together to solve a series of challenging problems. The atmosphere was excellent throughout and it is clear that there are a great many strong contenders for pupil leadership roles next year.

#### A Day in the life of Reception

We begin with the daily recap of the previous day, evening or weekend. During this time Reception sit in a circle, taking turns to hear about their friends' recent experiences, activities they have enjoyed, family they have visited or places they have seen.

Next is phonics, where the children hear new sounds and engage in new ways to spell these sounds. After a read and race phonics game, a pair of children eagerly approach Miss Richardson and ask, "Can we carry on playing this?"

It's great that they're invested in the game, but next up is something just as exciting - hopscotch! The outdoor area provides a space where we can mark out a hopscotch game to jump on the latest tricky words we are recalling. We roll the dice, count the number, jump along and read the word.

The literacy lesson that follows covers communication and language as well as expressive performance and imagination using hot seat role-play. The children take turns to be characters from the latest book they have read, and think about what they might want to ask that character, and how they might respond. The current interest is understanding the world of Africa and the animals in different African countries. Julia Donaldson's 'The Ugly Five' is the latest find and the children hotseat the warthog, the wildebeest, vulture, hyena and marabou stork. What fun! The dialogue here might go

Child A: Why do you kill another animal?

Child B: I don't! Another animal kills it and then I eat the meat because I am a scavenger!

Child C: Why is your fur black?

Child D: So I can camouflage in the grass and other animals can't see me.

Often, basic questions lead to more complex and thought-provoking ones, such as, "How do wildebeest know to migrate? What makes them know to move on?"  $\frac{1}{2} \left( \frac{1}{2} \right) \left( \frac{1}{2$ 

During snack time, three little girls sit talking about the seeds inside the chopped apple on their plates. "Why do thou hour goods?"

"So they can grow more apples!"

"Oh yeah!"

This interest leads the class into yet another investigative topic on sowing sunflowers, understanding the care and growth process as well as monitoring the ever-growing plant that has sneakily shot upwards over the next couple of weeks. "Mine is the tallest": "Can I water the sunflowers today?"; "One has lost its leaves!"

After our snack and outdoor play with the other classes, the children come back to maths and begin a lesson on shapes. The children count the sides of the pentagon with the teacher, who marks each side as they count along. The markings make the house look like they've grown hair... "It's a hairy house!" cries one of the children, absolutely delighted with themselves. They all squeal in excitement as they rename the classic pentagon "The Hairy House." 3D shapes are next and the classic comparison of ice cream cones, ice cubes and Egyptian pyramids come into the discussion. "That pyramid looks like one from Egypt," a little girl points out. "That cone makes me feel hungry for ice cream!"

The day moves into lunch and lunch break where the children run, climb, scoot, chase, cycle and play team games. The quiet activity that follows after lunch includes some individual reading time, fine motor skills activities or a daily task.

The afternoon is broken up into a topic session, circle time, stories and, most important, child initiated play! The water table comes out and the potions begin... The lava monster is ready to catch children outside where hedgehog mats have been placed on the floor for safe points from the lava monster, aka Miss Richardson. A Banksy is being reimagined and drawn on the big blackboard outside and the dinosaur pod is being set out with nests for eggs, ready to be protected from predators. Meanwhile inside the classroom some junk modelling is being used to construct cameras, 3D printers, take may food, small world play garages and houses and many more creative delights.

The day closes with a request for musical statues and song choices to move along to. A calm, thoughtful story completes the day and a chat about our favourite activities from earlier is a positive and rewarding discussion for us to say goodbye


## A View of The Close From Prep School Head Boy

### Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Practice Expedition

Last weekend, 18 DofE participants, in 4 groups, navigated their way across the East Kent countryside to complete two days of walking until they successfully completed the Expedition section of their Bronze Level DofE Award.

Not only were they walking along a set route, they had to put up tents and cook their evening meal to prove they could look after themselves in the field.

The weather conditions changed throughout the weekend and added variety and challenge to the overall experience. Saturday started with sea mists, high winds, downpours – including heavy hail – and the windy showers throughout Saturday continued into Sunday morning. The final day ended in the relief of bright warm sunshine.

Because of the pandemic, DofE 'exceptional conditions' guidance was applied. This meant no overnight camping, the very local area was used and participants were required to carry just day sacks with appropriate kit. In addition to this challenge, a nearby police murder enquiry meant that, for safety reasons, the groups could not follow their own well-produced routes and had to follow a route that they had not seen before this weekend. The participants coped with all these challenges with good cheer, good sense and with great spirit; managing the camp craft activities – tent raising and packing, cooking and cleaning, shared navigation and route decision-making with various degrees of ease or difficulty!

For safeguarding reasons, each of the four groups completed checkpoint cards with information for the adult leaders about how they were getting on. For anonymity, as these cards are left dangling at pre-fixed locations, each group invented their own name (rather than using their own names on the checkpoint cards). So, "The Boyz", "Fantastic Four", "PHAM!" and "Skit's Mission" made their various ways to the final checkpoint and the minibus ride home back to base.






### Golfing Success
